Grasslands National Park- 3 hrs, 9 minutes away



Grasslands National Park is a Canadian National Park located near the village of Val Marie, Saskatchewan, This national park is north of Saco, Montana and lies adjacent to the international boundary.


Banff – 6.5 hrs away



Banff is a town within Banff National Park in Alberta, Canada. It is located in Alberta's Rockies along the Trans-Canada Highway, approximately 126 km west of Calgary and 58 km east of Lake Louise. At 1,400

to 1,630 m above sea level, Banff is the community with the second highest elevation in Alberta, after Lake Louise.

Dinosaur Provincial Park in Alberta- 3 hrs



Dinosaur Provincial Park is a UNESCO World Heritage Site located about two-and-a-half hours' drive east of **Calgary, Alberta, Canada**; or 48 kilometres (30 mi), about a half-hour drive northeast of **Brooks**. The park is situated in the valley of the **Red Deer River**, which is noted for its striking **badland** topography. The park is well known for being one of the richest **dinosaur** fossil locales in the world. Fifty-eight dinosaur species have been discovered at the park and more than 500 specimens have been removed and exhibited in museums around the globe. The renowned fossil assemblage of nearly 500 species of life, from microscopic fern spores to large carnivorous dinosaurs, justified its becoming a World Heritage Site in 1979.

T REX Discovery Center – 1 hr 5minutes Eastend - Wallace Stegner “Wolf Willow” home



The T.Rex Discovery Centre is a museum located in Eastend, Saskatchewan, Canada, that was built to contain the fossil remains of the *Tyrannosaurus rex* nicknamed "Scotty" which was found nearby. It also showcases many other fossil specimens that can be found in Saskatchewan and the surrounding area.


Eastend is also contains the Wallace Stegner home. The house was built in 1917 by George Stegner. His son, Pulitzer Prize winning author and founder of the Stanford School of Creative Writing, Wallace Stogner lived in this house from age 7 to 12. The community and geography made an indelible impression upon him as reflected in his prose and western essays especially 'Wolf Willow'.

Great Sand Hills Ecological Preserve 1 hr, 8 minutes



The Great Sandhills contain one of the largest set of active sand dunes in Canada. Rising high above the terrain, the Great Sandhills cover 1,900 square kilometres. The dunes are always moving and create an ever-changing landscape. The Great Sandhills are a paradise for bird watching, nature photography and fun in the sand.

Big Muddy Badlands – 4 ½ hours




The Big Muddy Badlands are a series of badlands in southern Saskatchewan and northern Montana along Big Muddy Creek. They are found in the Big Muddy Valley, a cleft of erosion and sandstone along Big Muddy Creek. The valley is 55 kilometres long, 3.2 kilometres wide and 160 metres deep. The valley was formed when it was part of an ancient glacial meltwater channel that carried great quantities of water southeastward during the last ice age.

Head-Smashed-In Buffalo Jump – 4 ¼ hours



Head-Smashed-In Buffalo Jump is a buffalo jump located where the foothills of the Rocky Mountains begin to rise from the prairie 18 km west of Fort Macleod, Alberta, Canada on highway 785. It is a UNESCO World Heritage Site and home of the museum of Blackfoot culture. Head-Smashed-In Buffalo Jump is one of the oldest, most extensive and best preserved sites that illustrate communal hunting techniques and of the way of life of Plains people who, for more than five millennia, subsisted on the vast herds of bison that existed in North America.

Writing-on-Stone Provincial Park 3 hr 24 min



Writing-on-Stone Provincial Park is located about 100 kilometres southeast of Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada, or 44 kilometres east of the community of Milk River, and straddles the Milk River itself. It is one of the largest areas of protected prairie in the Alberta park system, and serves as both a nature preserve and protection for a large number of aboriginal rock carvings and paintings
